





EMERGENCY CHOLERA OUTBREAK RESPONSE - REPORT

KHARTOUM STATE | MAY-JUNE 2025



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BACKGROUND

During May and June 2025, Khartoum State in Sudan faced an alarming surge in cholera cases, marking one of the most severe outbreaks in the region in recent years. The crisis was fueled by a combination of ongoing conflict, the collapse of essential infrastructure, and a breakdown in water and sanitation systems. As a result, the number of reported cholera cases skyrocketed, with over **7,000** new cases documented in May alone—a nearly 400% increase compared to the previous month. The situation deteriorated rapidly; between May 15 and May 25, daily reported cases surged from **90 to 815**, highlighting the speed at which the disease was spreading throughout the city.

Several factors contributed to the outbreak's severity. Drone attacks on power plants and water sources left up to 80% of Khartoum's water systems non-functional, creating а shortage of clean water for the population. The ongoing war, which began in April 2023, has devastated health infrastructure, displaced millions, and severely limited access to medical care. The return of displaced people to Khartoum further strained scarce resources and accelerated the spread of cholera. Health facilities, already overwhelmed, saw many clinics and hospitals cease operations, with up to 80% closed in conflict zones and 45% elsewhere. Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) reported treating more than 3,300 suspected cholera cases in just one week in late May, underscoring the immense pressure on remaining health services.

Children have been particularly vulnerable, with over one million at risk in Khartoum State alone. The outbreak's has extended beyond immediate health crisis, threatening to deepen humanitarian suffering in a region already facing severe challenges. In response, a reactive oral cholera vaccination campaign was launched on June 10, targeting more than 2.6 million people in five of the worst-affected localities. International organizations such as the WHO and UNICEF have provided technical, logistical, material support, but funding remains insufficient to meet the overwhelming need. Additional efforts have focused sanitation, water, and hygiene (WASH) interventions to prevent further spread of the disease.







BACKGROUND


The cholera outbreak in Khartoum is part of a larger national crisis that began in July 2024 and has since spread to 92 localities across 13 of Sudan's 18 states, infecting 74,000 people and causing 1,826 deaths as of June 2025. Cross-border population movements and the approaching rainy season threaten to worsen the situation and increase the risk of cholera spreading to neighboring countries. Without urgent and sustained international intervention, the health and humanitarian crisis in Khartoum is expected to continue escalating.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In response to the cholera outbreak that emerged in Khartoum State, **the Alliance for Humanitarian Relief and Rebuilding in Sudan**—with financial support from the Sudanese American Medical Association (SAMA) and local implementation by We're All Values (WAV) and the Al-Rofaqaa Charity Organization for Sustainable Development—launched a coordinated emergency intervention to mitigate the impact of the crisis.

CHALLENGES ENCOUNTERED

- Limited availability of supplies amid high demand
- Compressed implementation timeline
- Lack of functioning isolation centers in some localities
- Logistical barriers due to poor infrastructure
- Community misconceptions about cholera and response teams
